We sent a team of 8 from our congregation to La Romana, Dominican Republic in January to continue the medical mission and construction of the Good Samaritan Hospital. Members of our church have been a part of this for more than 20 years now. Our group this year included Susan and Richard Lepore, Jason and Will Shealy, Heidi Töppel, Joanne Schneider, Tom Stevenson, and myself. We joined with other American Baptists from across Rhode Island, Maine, Iowa, and Kansas. The 30+ member team worked daily in the bateyes running medical clinics with the people who work in the sugar cane fields and continued construction at the hospital. Midweek, we took some time to go to the shore where we swam, and then shared a meal and communion on the beach. Jason celebrated his birthday while there with a cake and a cup of water poured over his head, Dominican style.

We recognize that those who travelled represented a cloud of witnesses from our entire congregation. Your contributions to the Roger Williams Attic sale and your donations of medical supplies benefited those we met and worked alongside while there. Your prayers buoyed us during our travels and labors.

Some have remarked that it would be more efficient and economical to send checks rather than people, however, our Dominican partners make it plain that they have priorities that go beyond numbers. They want teams to come so that we might know one another. These relationships are transformational. Anyone who has spent time on one of these missions cannot hear news reports about the Dominican Republic or Haiti in the same way afterwards. Knowing people who seek to live with dignity, with health and without fear of deportation changes one's perspective on immigration and why people risk everything in the hopes of a better life for their families.

Plans are already in place to return in January of 2027. Between now and then, continue to hold our Dominican and Haitian siblings in your prayers. Consider joining us next time; there is a place and role for you on the team.

Sunday February 16th

Myanmar: A State in Crisis - Ruth Marris Macaulay

The human rights crisis in Myanmar has worsened as the military authorities continue their crackdown on peaceful opposition. Unfair trials of pro-democracy activists continue and more than 1,600 people have been sentenced to imprisonment, hard labor or death. More than half a million people have been displaced. Tens of thousands of ethnic Rohingya people, forcibly displaced over a decade ago remained in squalid displacement camps. The military authorities prevented humanitarian aid from reaching them after a devastating cyclone in May 2023. The military junta has carried out aerial attacks on civilians, homes, and places of worship. Rights to freedom of expression, association and peaceful assembly are severely curtailed and journalists were among those imprisoned for their legitimate work.

For example, last Fall, CWS distributed 5,824 Emergency Cleanup Buckets, 10,310 Hygiene Kits, 7,280 Blankets, 1,800 Menstrual Hygiene Kits, 650 School Kits, and 72 Welcome Backpacks to partners in Florida and North Carolina after hurricanes devastated those areas.
