A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JAMIE

Don't you realize that all of you together are the temple of God and that the Spirit ofGod lives in and among you?

1 Corinthians 3:16

We live in the midst of interesting times. The national and international stages are in states of turmoil and flux; within our congregation we continue the work of making ourselves a safe and hospitable harbor for all people. Our picture directory is complete and in the hands of members. Construction of the ADA accessible, gender-neutral toilet continues; we are on target to have the project completed by Easter Sunday. During our annual meeting in February, we voted to affiliate with the Association of Welcoming and Affirming Baptists (AWAB). Each of these efforts enables us to better know one another, while making our welcome known and tangibly practical. Plans are coming together for our celebrations commemorating the 250th anniversary of the Meeting House on October 11-12, 2025. Mark your calendars now! It promises to be a time to remember.

While your calendar is out, make sure to make note of events on March 22 and 23rd. In partnership with the RI State Council of Churches, we will welcome Amanda Tyler of the Baptist Joint Committee (BJC) to Rhode Island for a workshop and discussion on Christian Nationalism and how Christians can (and should) work to counter this distortion of our faith. Tyler will return to our pulpit on Sunday March 23. If you would like an advance preview of her work, check out her recent book, *How to End Christian Nationalism*.

In this moment in our nation, and in this community, we need to be clear about our welcome as the church. When those on the margins are afraid, we must be bold in declaring our firm commitment to opening our hearts and doors wider to welcome in the immigrant, the refugee, queer folks, people whose bodies function differently than others, those in the cross hairs and those with their backs against the wall.

The monument we are called to build is a living one, a monument of love with Jesus as our solid foundation. Now is not the time for fear or living small. We need to be wholehearted and monumental in our living. This is a time to build up what will endure by affirming and supporting one another.

1 Corinthians 3:16 reminds us that all of us together are the temple of God and the Spirit of God lives within and among us. God is manifest in our coming together and staying together. We live in interesting times; it is a goodtime to be a part of the church.

IN MEMORIAM



Lena Gates died Sunday morning, February 9, 2025, from pancreatic cancer at Hopehealth Hulitar Hospice Center in Providence. She became a member of FBCIA nearly 79 years ago when she was baptized on Maundy Thursday evening on April 18, 1946, just one week shy of being 12 years old. During her long tenure in the church, she became one of the two first women deacons on March 26, 1972.

Lena was born in Providence on April 25, 1934, youngest of

five children of Harry and Elena (Zeminkova) Rosiak, immigrants from Kiev, Russia, [now Ukraine]. Her parents were part of a Russian immigrant congregation that met in the Meeting House for a number of years, and they became members of FBCIA in 1942. Lena was the last person associated with that ethnic church. She graduated from Hope High School in 1952 and married Raymond Pate after graduation. They had a daughter, Janet (Pate) Heaton in1953. Lena worked at various jobs, including as a cashier for the local Pinkerton Company while her husband was a helper in a bakery. After divorcing Pate in 1955, she married Noel Gates, a World War II army veteran and policeman, in 1961, and they had two daughters, Pauline Ashworth and Maurine Quinlan. But then, her husband died from brain cancer in July 1974. She spent most of her working years in customer service with various dairy distributers, including Yankee Milk, Ocean State Dairy, and many years for the H.P. Hood Dairy Company. Working at Hood, she met a widower, Arthur Marois, who became her long-time friend and companion for 38 years. He too was a veteran of World War II, having served in the Navy, and he passed away in 2017.

Lena Gates served the church in many ways for many years. She was a sponsor from our church to the Baptist Home in Newport from 1970 to 1975. As noted above, she was one of the first women deacons (1972-1975) and served two more terms (2006-2009 and 2011-2013). She also served on the Board of Missions and Evangelism from 2005 to 2008. Lena was the mainstay of the Social Committee, serving six terms (usually chair) adding up to eighteen years from1974 through 2023. She faithfully attended of the mission committee dinners at the restaurants of immigrants and refugees and at Friday Seekers.
